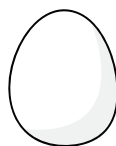

The short e sounds like the beginning of the word “egg”.

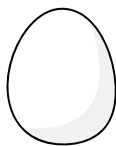

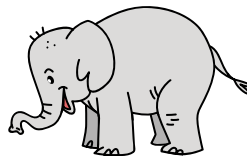

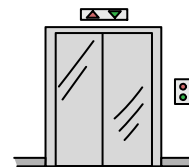
The following words begin with the short e sound. Ask your child to point to each word and say it out loud.
